## Ladies and gentlemen

A few words about child protection. I am in awe of all those who work in this enormously challenging field. I know that it is gratifying work, but I know too that it is hard work. Sometimes sad work. It can be stressful, and in extreme circumstances, it can be traumatic. Especially for those on the front line.

Thank goodness for all of you with the vocation and the commitment to stay the course. To protect those who cannot protect themselves. To advocate for them. To work on policies. To galvanise others. To develop ideas, organisations, strategies and training for better services.

I see that two of these awards are named for someone who certainly stayed the course. Robin Clark was a respected and inspirational leader in the field.

So are those of you in this room. Our community can be grateful to you, for the skills and resilience that you have demonstrated in your work.

I look forward to chatting to you, and then I hope that you will stay to enjoy a tour of the State Apartments.
